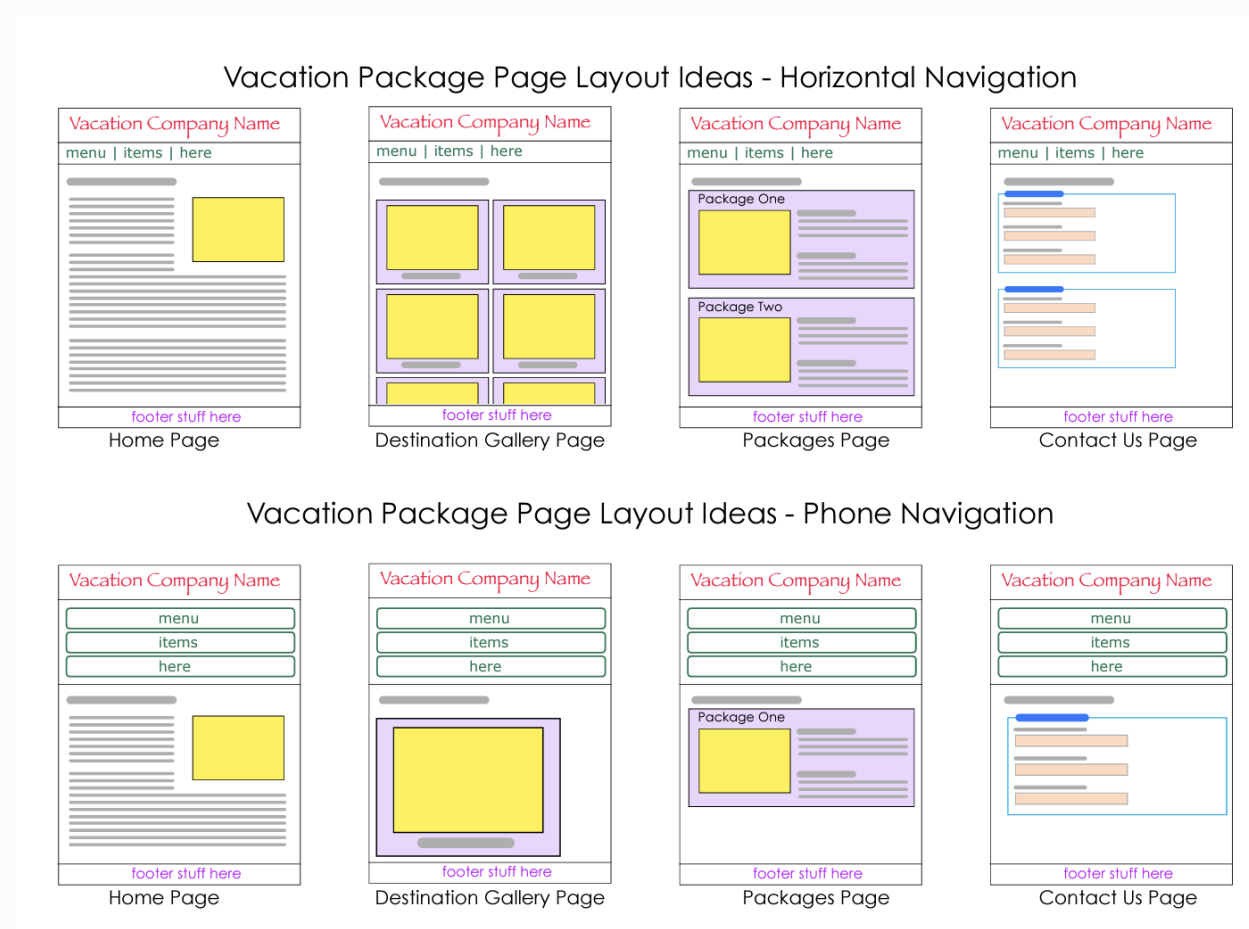


Getting Started

Outside of that I was free to design and code the site how I thought was best. This level of freedom made me a bit nervous getting started but focusing on one page at a time allowed me to get going slowly and with more confidence.

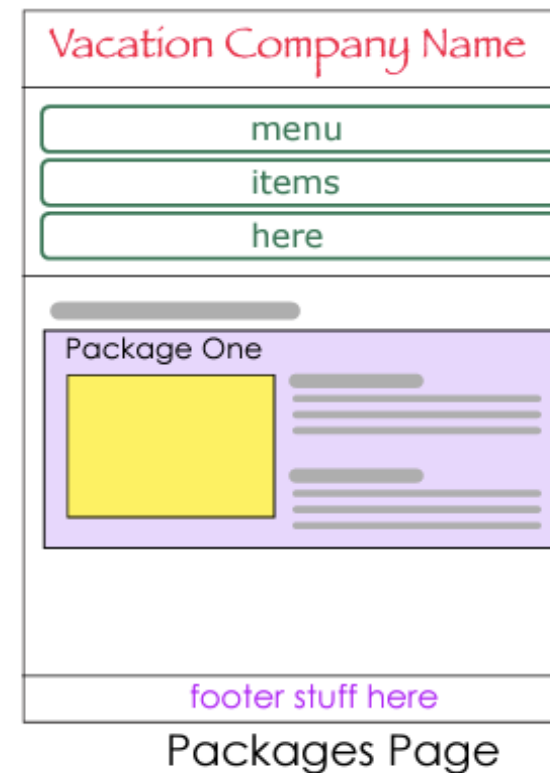
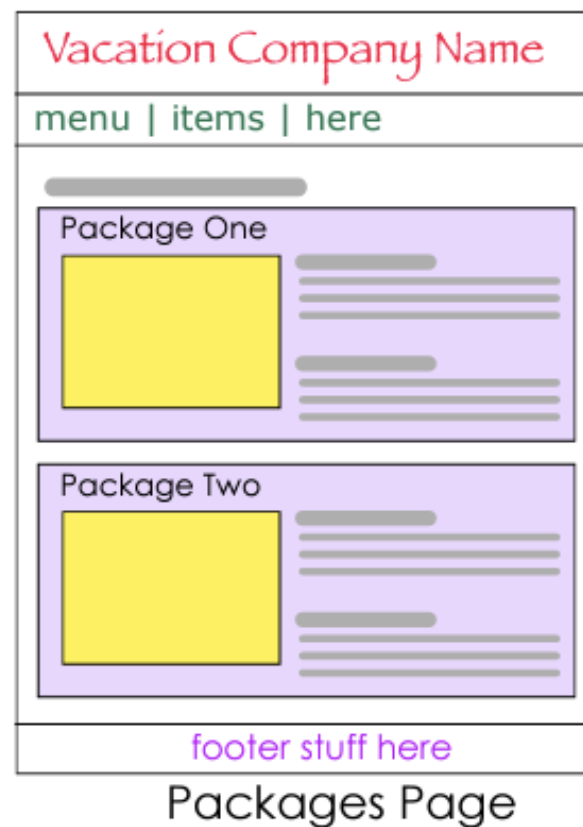
Setting up the basic foundation of the site helped me take on the project piece by piece and gave me the confidence to experiment with the layout. The wireframes communicated that the nav bar could be placed under the header but I decided to combine the two in one bar because it was always something I saw in other sites but never applied to my own in class.



For the mobile version of the nav bar I stuck closer to the wireframes. I did decide to go for a more simplified style in terms of the wayfinding and structure of the buttons.

Complications

With the foundation of the site set up I was able to get the Home page and Destinations page completed. I really began to struggle on the Vacation Packages page. The combination of an image and text box really threw me off since I hadn't had much practice with it. Along with that, making it responsive also added another layer of difficulty.

Above is how I ended up coding the HTML for a “package”. I wanted the image to be on the left side of the text card so I made the div a flexbox. The issue was that the text laying out the package details was too long so the text box kept wrapping and ending up below the image. However, if I turned off flex-wrap it wouldn't be responsive in the way I wanted, which was to have the image stay as big as possible by wrapping to the top of the box in the mobile version.

In order to fix the issue I tried various ways of rearranging the HTML and even trying CSS grid instead of flexbox, which didn't work how I wanted. After some frustration I took a break and came back to it with fresh eyes and asked myself what the issue was in simple terms. Ultimately, the boxes were behaving the same way in the desktop and mobile version when I needed them to do different things. So that got me thinking how can I make separate rules for each version? Media queries.
